

Education: There are a number of wonderful pro-life books that will not only inform but inspire you to keep working to protect children-in-utero. Shown on the left is *40 Days for Life*, by David Bereit and Shawn Carney. Here you will learn the story of how 40 Days started as well as numerous stories of babies being saved by the presence of volunteers praying outside the clinics, often without a word being said. Other recommended titles are:

unPlanned, by Abby Johnson. Her experience as a Planned Parenthood employee and how she became pro-life.

The Walls are Talking, by Abby Johnson. Former abortion workers tell their stories.


Pro-Life Answers to Pro-Choice Arguments by Randy Alcorn –addresses arguments concerning humanity and personhood, rights, social issues, health and safety, and the hard cases.

The Case for Life, Equipping Christians to Engage the Culture, by Scott Klusendorf. Discusses the need to get to the real issue of the nature of the unborn, and identifying and answering moral relativism.

Common Ground Without Compromise 25 Questions to Create Dialogue on Abortion by Stephen Wagner. Focuses on the importance of creating common ground to start a conversation rather than a debate.



Prayer: Dear Father God, please help every American be open to learning the truth about abortion. Help these books to be widely read and used to help every American understand that abortion is fundamentally about the reality of the child-in-utero as a child of God with the right to life. Help us to be able to find common ground to discuss the issue with our friends and helping them to see the truth, rather than seeking to win an argument. Let the stories from Planned Parenthood and other abortion clinics expose the reality of the selling of abortions at the expense of caring for women.



Action: Choose at least one book to read this summer. Find it at the library, at a bookstore, or at Amazon or other online source. Used copies are often available at lower cost. Share what you have learned with your friends and if you own the book, lend it out for them to read. Maybe a few friends can get together and each buy and read a different book, and keep swapping them until everyone has had a chance to read them all. Discuss what you have learned. The first three books are easy reads with stories, while the latter three are more detailed about apologetics. You may want to simply look through the sections you are most interested in, and

keep the book as a reference.
